JANUARY 20, 2011 REGULAR MEETING OF THE N.I.M.C.

Warren opened the meeting, thanking everyone for coming. Guests Bob Giffin and Svetlana Miles were introduced—Bob had specimens from rockhounding to identify, if possible. Minutes of the last meeting were approved as printed and seconded by Mike Rose.

A show board meeting was held at Ev and Erna's on Jan. 8. Ideas are needed, volunteers to construct liners for cases in Feb. or March., and show plans finalized. Bev will get and cut material for the liners (5 sets) and Warren will get sturdy foam for risers. Need to gather sturdy cardboard, thin wood reinforcements (donated by Lowe's), glue, duct tape. Warren asks anyone who can, get in touch with places like Fred's appliances for large—at least 2 x 4 feet pieces of heavy cardboard. Mike says that the cases need lights as well as liners. Bob Bockman offered to fix anything that is needed and we'll set them up in April to make sure everything works. Terry Deal will be demoing his cabbers again this year. If all goes well Norm might be demonstrating faceting. Vendors are lining up nicely. Treasurers report was received.

Warren brought up the by-laws that need amending, and that will be put in the newsletter to be added to the present copy. (Mike is putting all kinds of interesting things on our web site. Hope everyone is looking!!) No old business

New business—membership needs to be increased. **Any Ideas?? Help will be appreciated.**

Three dealers qualified to furnish the grand prize, and since the list that was provided by Bev at the meeting was not accurate (Bend Beads was not one)—the award went to C'Annes of Montana. Bev reported on land issues. The BRC was successful in getting gas tax money back for use on ORV trails and roads, which we will also be able to access.

Maria is not able to continue as secretary at this time. (Talked to her this week, and the arm will be slow to heal, but she is doing OK. She has been able to get some home help, which is great! Ed.)

Bill Johnson suggested that we get applications to have displays of club work and projects in the libraries and at NIC—needs to be done soon!!

Warren adjourned the meeting for the program and refreshments. We had a rock identification game which was fun and informative, and four prizes were given—two for beginners and two for more advanced.

Idaho Recreation Council Meeting Jan. 29 in Boise, ID.

This is a general meeting held three times per year in Boise.

"The purpose and objectives of the Council are stated as follows: "The Idaho Recreation Council is a recognized, statewide, collaboration of Idaho recreation enthusiasts and others that will identify and work together on recreation issues in cooperation with land managers, legislators and the public to ensure a positive future for responsible outdoor recreation access for everyone, now and into the future.

The Idaho Recreation Council is a collaboration of Idaho recreation enthusiasts on the following activities: 4x4, Equestrian, Backcountry Aviators, Mountain Biking, Snowmobiles, Motorcycles, Rafts/Jet Boats and ATV/UTV's"

One rockhound activist, the writer, joined the Idaho Recreation Council (IRC), representing the American Lands Access Association on behalf of Idaho rockhounds. Idaho-Gem and Mineral Clubs are urged to join the Idaho Recreation Council. We can work to maintain access to rockhounding sites on public lands by working with the IRC in keeping roads and trails open for public use.

Some rockhounds in Idaho also utilize ATV's in rockhounding. Over the years in contacting state and federal legislators the number of people I represented in the telephone call has been important to the official contacted. Our numbers added to state recreational organizations will be important.

David Claycomb, Recreation Resources Bureau Chief, Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, discussed road closures. Several hundred miles of roads have been closed in Forest Services and Bureau of Land Management lands in the last several years. One of the most effective tools in bringing the situation to public attention has been use of letter to licensed ATV, OHV snowmobile and boat owners. Two letters were sent on proposed road closures on BLM and Forest Service lands and one letter on the possible closure of a boat dock on Lake Coeur d'Alene. These letters generated significant levels of attention.

David's office will continue sending letters, to his data base, regarding proposed closure of roads, trails and boating facilities.

Cooperation and respect for ranchers and others using public lands was discussed. Unfortunately not all recreational users of public lands belong to organized clubs. Members of the IRC have the same problems we have when non-club members are active on public lands and do not observe ethical and respectful behavior toward others and to the areas in which they are recreating.

BUFFS AND POLISHING COMPOUNDS Hatrockhounds, 9-10/04

Many stones polish equally well with several buff and polishing compound combinations A very hard gem can be polished by a much softer polishing compound. Only one polishing compound should be used on a buff.

Polishing does not remove any material from the surface. If scratches develop the stone must be resanded.

BUFFS; Canvas: useful when polishing heat-sensitive stones :develops little friction.

Muslin: recommended for soft stones and heat sensitive gems

Leather: versatile, efficient, economical. Excellent for polishing stones that will undercut

Felt: useful for polishing glass and stones of even texture. Not for stones that undercut. Heats rapidly

Phenolic: Phenolic tools or lap discs are useful when impregnated with diamond grit.14,000M (pre-polish) or 50,000M (polish) diamond compound can be applied to the surface of a phenolic disc and worked with the gemstone mounted on a dopstick. The diamond will charge the phenolic making smoothing and polishing easy.

POLISHING COMPOUNDS: Cerium Oxide: faster than conventional compounds. and superior polish. Use less. Use on pellaon, felt, foams, thermoplastic polishing pads. Favored for quartz type minerals and others. Not for stones that undercut.

Linde "A": A .3 micron aluminum powder that is carefully graded for uniformity of grain size. Excellent for polishing stones that undercut.

Chromium Oxide: a hard polishing agent, green in color and stains badly. Useful for polishing jade and stones that undercut.

Tin Oxide: an excellent all purpose polish used to provide a high gloss finish.

Diamond: the most efficient polishing medium. Especially useful for polishing difficult to polish stones.
